#### PROLOGUE

Snow Maiden has been protected and hidden away all her life by her father, Father Frost, against the wishes of her mother, Mother Spring. This has angered Yarilo, the Sun God, resulting in a fifteen-year long winter. Snow Maiden longs to experience life with the people living in a nearby isolated community. Mother Spring and Father Frost agree for her be adopted by Bobil and his wife, Bobylikha.

#### ACT 1

Snow Maiden meets Lyel, a local boy, and is enchanted by his songs. She is disappointed when he leaves with a group of girls. Kupàva, a village girl, announces her marriage to Mizgìr. The betrothal ceremony takes place, but Mizgìr sees Snow Maiden and is enthralled by her beauty and begs her to love him. Kupàva is furious at Mizgìr's betrayal, and her friends advise her to speak to the Tsar.

#### ACT 2

Kupàva tells the Tsar what has happened and Mizgìr is asked to explain his behaviour. He is sentenced to exile but insists the Tsar would understand if he met Snow Maiden. The conversation is disrupted by the appearance of Snow Maiden. The Tsar asks whom she loves, and she confirms that she doesn't love anyone. The Tsar offers a reward to anyone who can gain Snow Maiden's love. The girls think the handsome Lyel will be successful, but Mizgìr swears he will win Snow Maiden's icy heart. The Tsar agrees to a contest to win Snow Maiden's love as the people sing his praises.

#### Interval

#### ACT 3

The people amuse themselves with dancing and singing. The Tsar invites Lyel to choose a girl to kiss in front of everyone and, despite Snow Maiden's pleas, he chooses Kupàva. Alone, Snow Maiden wonders why Lyel has rejected her. Mizgìr appears and tries once more to win her love. After he attempts to assault her, she runs off. Mizgìr follows, but soon loses his way. Lyel and Kupàva enter and declare their love for each other. Snow Maiden finds them and, seeing their happiness, at last truly wishes to have the capacity to love.

#### ACT 4

Snow Maiden asks Mother Spring for advice and is warned to stay out of the light of the sun. As the weather warms, flowers begin to bloom, and Snow Maiden begins to feel love. Mizgir appears and, as Snow Maiden's heart melts for the first time, she professes her love for him. The villagers, in bride and groom pairs, celebrate the day of the Sun God. Mizgir introduces Snow Maiden as his bride. As she declares her love for Mizgir, the sun starts to shine, and Snow Maiden melts into thin air. Unable to live without Snow Maiden, Mizgir drowns himself. The Tsar explains to the community that the deaths of Snow Maiden and Mizgir have ended the long winter. They sing a hymn of praise to Yarilo, the Sun God.

#### MATTHEW KOFI WALDREN

Matthew Kofi Waldren is a conductor of mixed British and Ghanaian ancestry, renowned for his detailed, responsive and collaborative approach to music-making. ENO Mackerras Fellow (2016-18) and nominated at the International Opera Awards (2017), he is recognised for an innate sense of theatre, equally at home in the concert hall, recording studio and theatre pit, even recording the soundtrack to London's new Elizabeth Line.

Recent engagements include Ainadamar and the acclaimed world premiere of Will Todd's Migrations (WNO), the British premiere of award-winning American opera Blue and Olivier nominated Paul Bunyan (ENO), a semistaged concert tour of The Pearlfishers (Opera North), concerts with the LPO, WNO Orchestra, the CBSO and CBSO Chorus, concerts and recordings with Chineke! Orchestra - including a disc of Grant Still's Symphony No.1 and Price's Symphony No. 3, a new orchestration of Jonathan Dove's Flight and Les mamelles de Tirésias (RCS Opera), L'elisir d'amore (West Green House), Opera Holland Park's La traviata, Pelléas et Mélisande (Scottish Opera), Alice's Adventures in Wonderland (Royal Opera Linbury, Signum Classic, OHP).

Described by The Sunday Times as 'one of the most adept and dynamic young British Verdians', Matthew Kofi has conducted highly acclaimed readings of *Un ballo in maschera*, *Rigoletto*, *La rondine*, *La bohème*, *Gianni Schicchi*, *Zanetto*, *II barbiere di Siviglia (also Lakmé*, *Les pêcheurs de perles* and *Fantastic Mr Fox*) for Opera Holland Park, *La bohème*, *Don Giovanni*, *La petite bohème* (Opera North), *Le nozze di Figaro* (English National Opera), *La cenerentola* (West Green House) and *Gianni Schicchi* (RCS).

#### JAKUB PRZYBYCIEŃ

Jakub Przybycień is a Polish conductor and violinist. Having grown up in the orchestra, he stands out for his excellent understanding of the orchestral perspective. He has dedicated himself to conducting as a way of using his voice and standing up for his beliefs. Musicians from orchestras from all over the world appreciate his energetic and charismatic manner, and his clear character and musical ideas inspire musicians and audiences wherever he goes.

For the 2023/24 season Jakub is assistant conductor of Maestro Ludovic Morlot by the Barcelona Symphony Orchestra and National Orchestra of Catalonia and the Mills Williams Junior Fellow in Conducting at the RNCM. To further develop his musical and technical skills as a conductor, Jakub has participated in masterclasses by eminent conductors such as Neeme, Paavo and Kristjan Järvi, Marin Alsop, Jaap van Zweden, Peter Eötvös, Jorma Panula and Michael Sanderling. He has collaborated with orchestras including the London Symphony Orchestra, Baltic Sea Philharmonic, Ensemble Ars Nova, Württembergische Philharmonie Reutlingen, Philharmonie Baden-Baden, Philharmonie Südwestfalen, Kritisches Orchester Berlin, Göttinger Symphonie Orchester, Philharmonie Hradec Králové, Opéra Orchestre National Montpellier Occitanie and the Polish Radio National Symphony Orchestra. This season, Jakub will be working with the Balthasar Neumann Ensembles and the Zielona Góra Philharmonic Orchestra.

Jakub's musical education started at the age of six with the violin. During his career as a violinist, he received laureates in national and international competitions. His many achievements include qualifying for the prestigious European Union Youth Orchestra, where he worked with and learned from maestro Bernard Haitink, Manfred Honeck, Noah Bendix-Balgley, and Lorenza Borrani. Between 2014-2019 he studied violin with Professor Monika Urbaniak Lisik at the Academy of the Arts in Bern (CH), graduating with distinction. While studying violin he started pursuing his career as a conductor. He obtained his Bachelor's degree in orchestral conducting with honors at the Academy of Music in Wrocław (PL) with Professor Marek Pijarowski. During this time he worked with the NFM Wrocław Philharmonic and the Lower Silesian Philharmonic Orchestra in Jelenia Góra. For his Master's, Jakub studied in the class of Professor Johannes Schlaefli at the Zurich University of the Arts (CH).

#### **KEVIN THRAVES**

As a freelance repetiteur, Kevin has worked for many leading opera companies including Scottish Opera, Opera North, Welsh National Opera, English National Opera, Essential Scottish Opera, Clonter Opera, Batignano Musica nel Chiostro (Italy), Scottish Opera-Go-Round, and the Buxton International Festival. He has also worked alongside many of the UK's leading orchestras including The Hallé, the BBC Concert Orchestra during the Proms season at the Royal Albert Hall, the BBC Philharmonic, Manchester Camerata, The Academy of Ancient Music, and the London Philharmonic Orchestra under the direction of Sir Simon Rattle, Barry Wordsworth, Sir Richard Armstrong, Tugan Sokhiev, Sir Neville Marriner, Sir Mark Elder, and Edward Gardner.

His work as an accompanist and repetiteur has led to many recordings and broadcasts for radio and television both in the UK and abroad. UK concert appearances include Wigmore Hall, The Purcell Room, The Queen Elizabeth Hall, St John's Smith Square, St Martin in-the-Fields, The Royal Albert Hall, St David's Hall in Cardiff, and The Bridgewater Hall in Manchester. Kevin has a busy and varied recital career which has led to performances across Europe, Asia, and Oceania. Recently, Kevin was the co-chorus master for the world premiere of Mark Wigglesworth's *Magnificat* in Bergen, Norway, and the chorus master for performances of Puccini's *Madama Butterfly* for The Hallé.

Kevin is Deputy Head of Opera at the Royal Northern College of Music where he has worked on many of the award-winning operas as music staff, repetiteur and as the RNCM Opera chorus master.

#### **BETHAN RHYS WILIAM**

Born in Swansea, after studying vocational dance at Bush Davies School, Bethan's professional career began in Ghent, Belgium as a dancer with the Royal Opera Ballet and continued with engagements with: Ballet International, The Iranian National Ballet, Malmö Stadsteater, Northern Ballet Theatre, including gala performances at the London Coliseum and Royal Festival Hall with Dame Margot Fonteyn and Rudolf Nureyev in his *Nureyev and Friends* seasons. She was a founder member of London City Ballet. She has also danced on tours of Italy, France, Romania and Norway.

Since 1996 Bethan was engaged as tutor in Movement, Dance and Physical awareness at the Royal Northern College of Music. In addition to her academic teaching role she was involved as choreographer/movement coach/ assistant director for Stefan Janski's numerous opera and musical theatre productions. She also collaborated on Garth Bardsley's staging of Benjamin Britten's A Midsummer Night's Dream for the RNCM which won the opera prize at the 2016 Manchester Theatre Awards. More recently Bethan worked on several RNCM opera productions with Stuart Barker and Jonathan Cocker. Her work also includes productions with Jack Edwards, Jennifer Hamilton, Sandra Dugdale's numerous Gilbert and Sullivan seasons and has directed semi-staged performances of Purcell's Dido and Aeneas and Handel's Belshazzar for the Manchester Camerata. She was engaged as choreographer for The Library Theatre's staging of Charles Dickens's Hard *Times* at Murray's Mill, Manchester and for Alan Bennett's adaptation of Kenneth Grahame's The Wind in The Willows at the Lowry Quays Theatre, directed by the late Chris Honer.

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#### YIHUI WANG

Yihui Wang is a second-year postgraduate lyric tenor from China studying with Thomas Schulze, kindly supported by an ABRSM Scholarship. During his time at the RNCM, Yihui showcased his versatility by taking on diverse operatic roles, from Bobil-Bakula in The Snow Maiden to Nemorino in L'elisir d'amore. He has also collaborated with renowned institutions, notably singing at The Bridgewater Hall, and performing with Opera North and the Hallé Orchestra.

#### **OLIVIA SWAIN**

Olivia is an Australian soprano pursuing a Postgraduate Diploma in Advanced Studies (Performance) with Linda Richardson, supported by the Helen Rachael Mackaness Charitable Trust.

Prior to relocating to the UK, Olivia performed as a 2023 Young Artist with Pacific Opera Studio Sydney, sponsored by the Wagner Society NSW. Supported by The John Holt Todd and Florence Todd Scholarship and mentored by soprano Dr Rowena Cowley, Olivia holds both a Bachelor's and Master's degree from the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. Repertoire includes significant role performances of Donna Elvira (*Don Giovanni*), Berta (*II Barbiere di Siviglia*), the Mother (*Amahl and the Night Visitors*), Mimì (*La Bohème*), Hippolyta (*A Midsummer Night's Dream*) and Erste Dame (*Die Zauberflöte*).
