STUDENT AWARDS

Student Awards (scholarships and bursaries) have a transformative impact, championing talent and helping young musicians to overcome challenges to being able to study. We are humbled that many donors increased their support significantly this year to ensure students are able to continue to live and study in Manchester in the face of the ongoing cost-of-living crisis.

A number of substantial philanthropic gifts helped establish a new wave of awards focussed on equitable access to musical education, including for disabled and neurodiverse students, for students from specific regions nationally and internationally, and targeted awards to ensure support for students across a wide range of instruments and disciplines.

RNCM UKRAINIAN MUSICIANS FUND

This year, the RNCM Ukrainian Musicians Fund provided essential support to **five Ukrainian undergraduate and postgraduate students** across the Schools of Strings, Keyboard Studies, and Wind, Brass and Percussion. Ukrainian musicians on our Junior RNCM and Young Artists programmes have also benefited from vital philanthropic support.

This funding has enabled these talented musicians to pursue their dreams of studying music, with the RNCM as their home.

RNCM INNOVATE

RNCM Innovate is our platform for experimentation and discovery, enabling students and staff to push the boundaries of traditional music practices and drive the industry of tomorrow.

THE FUTURE IS GREEN

As part of our year-long theme focusing on climate change and the natural world, donations supported a new **Green Fund** which enabled **five student groups** to bring their green-inspired initiatives to life. Students used their funding to develop unique projects that use music as a powerful tool to spark meaningful conversations and encourage audiences to consider their response to climate change and sustainability.

RNCM CREATIVE INNOVATORS AWARD

The RNCM Creative Innovators Award recognises students who excel in creative ambition and entrepreneurship. Students pitched their business ideas to a panel of industry experts, with **four winners** receiving financial support and mentoring to help them develop their pioneering projects, from immersive, multi-disciplinary performances and installations to a new chamber music festival and a project combining music and ecology.

MUSIC & HEALTH


In the first year of this three-year funded project, **16 students** received intensive, specialised training to work therapeutically with children and young people in health, care, and special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) settings, in partnership with professional music therapy organisations Songbirds Music UK and Jessie's Fund.

RNCM ENDANGERED INSTRUMENTS APPEAL


You donated £55,000 to help us deliver targeted initiatives to support young musicians in playing the viola, double bass, oboe, bassoon, French horn, bass trombone and tuba.

Funds raised are helping to target the declining number of musicians choosing these at-risk instruments at a young age, and supporting them on their musical journeys from the point of first access right through to conservatoire study and beyond.

This issue remains a strategic priority for at least the next decade, as we continue to support under-18s to overcome barriers to studying endangered instruments, with tailored financial support and world-class tuition and training from some of the world's very best musicians.

SPECIALIST FUNDED PROJECTS

WILLIAMS-HOWARD PRIZE

This prize celebrates the study and performance of art songs by composers of the African diaspora. Alongside monetary prizes for **six students**, winners received bespoke coaching and performed at Buxton International Festival. What's more, students feel inspired to incorporate these works in their own programmes, championing underrepresented pieces and sharing them with new audiences.

STRING QUARTET STUDIO

Thanks to long-term philanthropic support, the Studio offers young musicians intensive, bespoke training, developing the experience, networks, and confidence required to progress at a professional level as chamber musicians.

'The Studio has given us the opportunity to focus an incredible amount of time on rehearsing together, improving at a rate which would not have been possible without the support of this programme and leading to some fantastic opportunities and achievements.'

JOSÉ AND RAFTON SMALLWOOD MASTERCLASS SERIES

Continued generosity enabled **twelve singers** and **seven pianists** to work with one of our International Visiting Professors, promoting cross-school collaboration and enabling students to gain valuable experience by exploring new and familiar repertoire through a fresh lens. Additionally, pianists enjoyed the opportunity to perform on the fortepiano – a challenging and rewarding experience.

PRINCIPAL'S CIRCLE

Our Principal's Circle are a warm and loyal family of supporters and are an integral part of our community.

Their collective and continued generosity has a huge impact on life at the RNCM, enabling a wide range of unique opportunities that enrich our students' learning experience.

This year 40 members supported with £49,000

Their contributions helped make the following projects a reality:

- → A pilot project for RNCM composers creating new music to help people with Parkinson's manage daily activities.
- → An artist residency for virtuoso sitarist Jasdeep Singh Degun, developing students' musical breadth and collaborative skills.
- Guest artists for RNCM Lab Week, supporting our students' learning, development, and ideas around being a sustainable musician.
- → Two students travelling to Sydney, Australia to compose for the Sydney Symphony Orchestra Fellows and receive professional mentorship.
- A duo of Popular Music students performing at Manchester Children's Hospital for children and their families.
- → **Purchasing an upright piano** as part of our RNCM Piano Fleet Campaign.
- → Match funding for saxophone students to attend the European Saxophone Congress in Trento, Italy.
- → Harp students performing at the prestigious Edinburgh International Harp Festival, plus attending workshops and concerts.
- → Supported the RNCM Green Fund, allowing students to apply for funding to develop green-inspired musical initiatives.

Principal's Circle members come together regularly with our Principal, students, and staff at special events to see the impact of their support first-hand. Event highlights this year included a vocal masterclass with Ann Murray DBE and an insight into research around music and neuroscience.

RNCM FNGAGE: FDUCATION

RNCM Engage encompasses a wide range of initiatives to inspire children and young people to make music, helping to raise musical attainment and providing progression pathways to higher music education and beyond. Entirely supported by philanthropy, your support for RNCM Engage: Education is critical.

PATHFINDER

Pathfinder provided free, bespoke training, support and mentoring to **54 young musicians** experiencing barriers to their musical development. Alongside group activities, staff ran one-on-one sessions to focus on individual challenges. Increasingly, Pathfinder is working hand-in-hand with our other projects to provide individual and flexible support for young people as, when, and how they need it, in order for them to achieve their full musical potential.

'The staff are exemplary, and the entire environment is nurturing and wholesome. As a parent, you really feel your child is cared for, safe and happy. I have never seen him so immediately comfortable in a completely new, and potentially intimidating, space and atmosphere. He now calls the RNCM his 'Happy Place'.'

RNCM YOUNG PROJECTS

Free targeted instrumental workshops enabled **257 young musicians** aged 5-18 to experience the joy of learning an instrument in a group setting, enhance their skills, and meet like-minded peers. Open to all, these programmes are a key component in addressing the declining number of children learning endangered instruments.

RNCM TRANSITIONS

Through one-to-one mentoring, audition advice, and application assistance tailored to the needs of each participant, RNCM Transitions helps raise the aspirations of young people aged 16-20 who require additional support with pursuing music studies at Higher Education level.

RNCM YOUNG ARTISTS

Participants on our award-winning popular music programme for 11–18-year-olds learn key industry skills from RNCM student mentors and industry professionals. These include composition, recording, production, and performance. A generously supported provision of fully subsidised places ensures we can accommodate young musicians regardless of financial circumstances.

JUNIOR RNCM

Taking over our building on Saturdays, JRNCM delivers an outstanding musical education to **203 talented young musicians** aged 8-18 each year. It offers a comprehensive programme of instrumental tuition, academic study, ensemble coaching, composition, conducting and more, preparing musicians for further study at conservatoire level and beyond.

RNCM ENGAGE WEST CUMBRIA

Over 2,100 children and young people had the chance to try an instrument for the first time or learn new skills from staff and student mentors this year. Made possible by a transformational gift, the first year of this five-year programme focused on establishing the needs of schools and communities in West Cumbria, with taster sessions in 21 schools and brass bands.



RNCM FNGAGE: COMMUNITY

RNCM Engage also includes a range of outreach activities that bring members of our local community closer to the RNCM, both on-site and around Greater Manchester.

RNCM CHILDREN'S OPERA

A charitable grant enabled **130 children** to take part in our annual Children's Opera. The children, from local primary schools in areas of social deprivation and low arts engagement, co-created and performed a new work based on *The Jungle Book*.

RNCM COMMUNITY OPERA

A grant also supported our inaugural Community Opera, developing the skills and confidence of local residents, and culminating in performances on our Theatre stage. **129 local residents**, including our new openaccess Community Chorus, community organisations, and primary school children, devised a brand-new opera about the importance of holding on to our green spaces.

Both our Children's Opera and Community Opera explored environmental themes as part of our *The Future is Green* initiative and provided unique training opportunities for **over 150 RNCM students** who worked with the groups.

THROWING OPEN THE CONCERT DOORS

Over **1,350 archive recordings**, which may otherwise have been lost forever, have been conserved and digitised and are now available to listen to online and in person at the RNCM, thanks to a substantial grant and support from our alumni.

The project has also delivered bespoke workshops with **five local community groups** for people experiencing isolation or other challenges, and collected a series of oral histories to bring to life the stories and memories of our alumni, staff, and audiences.



RNCM PIANO FLEET CAMPAIGN

We are raising funds to purchase our fleet of 132 pianos, one of the largest in the UK. Currently leased, we have the opportunity to purchase the entire fleet at an exclusive price when our lease expires in July 2025. Purchasing all our pianos, from concert grands to uprights, will ensure long-term savings and financial sustainability, whilst enabling continued excellence in music teaching and access to the finest possible instruments for students, tutors, visiting artists, and RNCM Engage participants.

We are reaching out to our wider community to ask for help in taking control of this essential and appreciating asset for the RNCM into the future.

Thanks to a significant charitable grant and generous support from individuals, we are thrilled to have received **over £800,000** in support so far.
