


ALUMNI, STAFF AND **GUEST ARTISTS**

RNCM ENGAGE: EDUCATION

We're dedicated to tackling the challenges surrounding music education and RNCM Engage is central to our work.

This award-winning programme of free and subsidised projects encourages children and young people across the North West and beyond to build their skills and confidence in music. Throughout our anniversary, we stepped up our commitment to this vital area of work, helping young musicians to overcome barriers through initiatives such as RNCM Young Projects, Young Artists, Young Strings, and Pathfinder.

All of this is complementary to the incredible work undertaken at **Junior RNCM**, our centre for advanced training for talented young musicians aged eight to 18.

Each Saturday during term time the RNCM is their home; a place to study with exceptional tutors, perform with like-minded people, and make long-lasting friendships. It's also a place that looks to the future, teaching transferrable skills for life, and creating a solid platform for further study at a conservatoire or university.






RNCM ENGAGE: COMMUNITY

RNCM Engage also provides our students with unrivalled opportunities for professional development through placements and projects in schools, hospitals, and care homes. It also reaches out to local communities through a range of family-friendly initiatives designed to make live music accessible to all.

Alongside our Young Explorers concert series, Children's Opera, and Christmas Family Day, RNCM50 saw us throw open our doors for Explore@ RNCM, a spectacular day of free creative workshops and performances from Manchester-based groups, followed by a performance of Sondheim's Into the Woods featuring our new Community Chorus and RNCM singers. The day ended with the launch of our Late Night Sessions, showcasing local DJs.

RNCM50 ALUMNI REUNION

Being part of our family doesn't end at graduation. The experiences and memories of RNCM alumni illustrate our history, and their professional journeys inspire our future.

During our anniversary, we were delighted to welcome back graduates from across the decades, with over 150 joining us for a very special reunion and a number returning to the stage for celebratory performances. Alongside this, many took part in advisory panels and mentoring programmes, attended professional networking events, and joined our online global network through *RNCM Connect*.

AWARDS AND RECOGNITION

Our 50th anniversary brought several awards and accolades, reflecting our position at the forefront of music education. They included:

→A Times Higher Education Award (Technical and Digital Innovation of the Year) in recognition of our response to teaching and performance during the pandemic.

→Two **HEIST Awards**, celebrating our creativity in Marketing and Student Recruitment.

→A Parson Music Advocacy Award for our research and activity into breaking down barriers to music education.

→A Manchester Youth Buzz Award, presented to our newly launched RNCM Young Artists initiative for emerging pop musicians aged 11 to 18 from across the North West.

→An IAML Excellence Award for the RNCM Library.

We were also incredible proud to share that **Professor Linda Merrick**, who celebrated 10 years as Principal in January 2023, was awarded a **CBE in the King's New Year Honours** for services to music in higher education.



THANK YOU

The RNCM thrives because of our incredibly generous community, and this year we raised £2.65 million, with a further £1.95 million committed to future projects.

Amongst a huge variety of support, we were proud to announce three new significant funded projects that will play a vital role in transforming lives through music:

RNCM ENGAGE CUMBRIA

Thanks to a £1.3million transformational gift, we were able to develop our award-winning music education programme, RNCM Engage, for school aged young people in West Cumbria.


THROWING OPEN THE CONCERT DOORS

A significant award from the National Lottery Heritage Fund gave us the go-ahead to digitise 1,000 at risk recordings in our archives while developing a new community engagement programme.

RNCM MUSIC AND HEALTH

Our anniversary Gala Dinner raised £65,000, enabling us to launch a three-year project that will train over 60 students to take therapeutic music provision into health settings.

Every grant or donation we receive is a vote of confidence in our talented students and means we can provide them with outstanding education and specialist training, propelling them into careers on the national and international stage. We are so grateful to those who support our mission to define the future of music.


